To make you and your work quickly accessible

## **Purpose 2:**

To highlight accomplishments you are proud of

## **Purpose 3:**

To help you stand out

## **Purpose 4:**

To humanize you

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# What should be on my website?

- ❖ Your name, contact info, and a picture of you
- ❖ A list of your papers and talks (with links!)
- ❖ Public code and data
- ❖ Your vision of your science!
- ❖ A short CV (webpage style) AND an up-to-date PDF CV (1-2 pages plus publications)
- ❖ Optional but useful:
  - ❖ Education and outreach activities, other service to the field.
  - ❖ Links to any press about your work

# Useful tips for your personal website

- ❖ Don't be afraid to sell yourself.
  - ❖ Who are you and should you be hired/invited to speak somewhere/recommended for something/ etc...
- ❖ Your chance to show your skills. Be creative.
- ❖ How often should you update?
  - ❖ I would recommend at least every 4-6 months (more often if actively searching) or after you finish any major work.
- ❖ Useful: Short descriptions of your papers, or your major research areas.
- ❖ Non-academic interests?
  - ❖ This is a personal decision. My recommendation: show your personality and what you care about but still think of your website as your professional face to the academic community.
